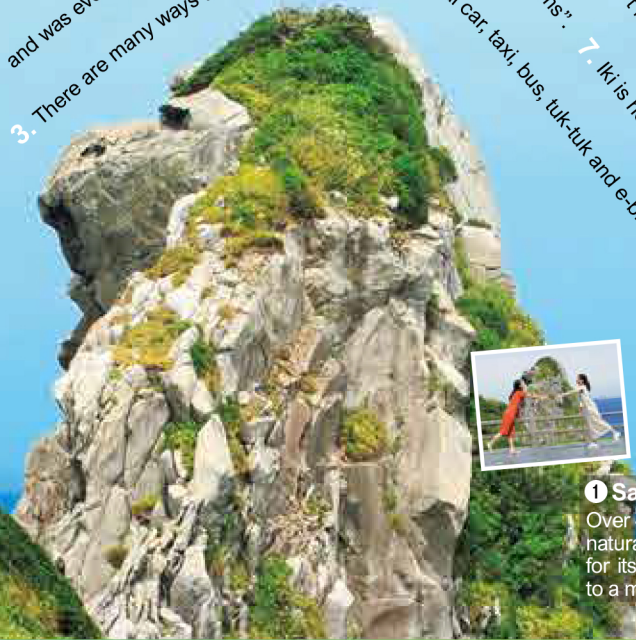

- 1. Iki Island is a remote island between Kyushu and Tsushima and is the 20<sup>th</sup> largest island in Japan (excluding Okinawa) with an area of 139.42 km<sup>2</sup>.
- 2. 15 kilometers east to west and 17 kilometers north to south – meaning you can cross the whole island in only 30 minutes!
- 3. Ama are traditional divers that harvest shellfish like sea urchin and abalone.
- 4. According to Japanese myth, when Iki Island was created, Iki Shochu was born and raised in the mineral-rich pastures of Iki.
- 5. Iki's highest mountain is 213 meters tall. Enjoy panoramic island views from the observation platform.
- 6. Iki has a long history and was even written about in "The Records of the Three Kingdoms".
- 7. Iki is home to over 280 kofun (ancient burial mounds) and over 150 Shinto shrines.
- 8. There are many ways to get around, such as rental car, taxi, bus, tuk-tuk and e-bike.
- 9. Iki-gyu cattle, a rare breed of Wagyu of which only 900 are raised each year, are born and raised in the mineral-rich pastures of Iki.
- 10. Iki Shochu is a Geographical Indication protected by the WTO.
- 11. Iki is home to about 300 traditional divers.
- 12. Fun Fact! Iki Island grows more asparagus than any other location in Nagasaki Prefecture!
- 13. Iki is the birthplace of Barley Shochu!
- 14. Iki Shochu has been produced for over 500 years.
- 15. There are seven shochu distilleries on the island.
- 16. Iki Shochu is a Geographical Indication protected by the WTO.
- 17. The Island's three ports (Gonoura, Ashibe, and Indoji) are all home to a tourist information center!
- 18. Thanks to the Tsushima warm current, summers on Iki are relatively cool and winters are relatively warm, although winter brings strong winds which can make the weather feel cold.
- 19. Since ancient times, barter has been common on the island.
- 20. There are four convenience stores on the island. It's said everything one needs can be produced on the island.

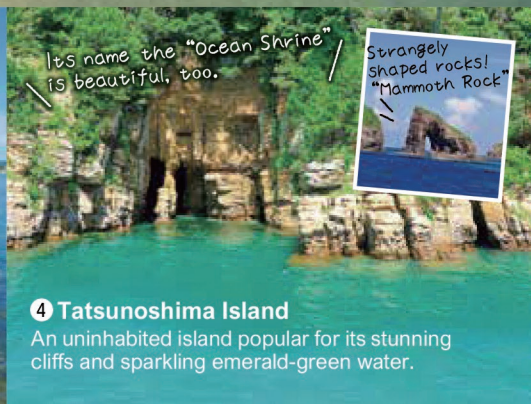

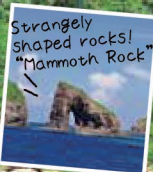
**2 Kojima Shrine**  
During low tide, a sandy path appears leading you to this mysterious island shrine.

### 3 Harahoge Jizo

These six unusual Jizo statues have a hole ("hoge") in their bellies ("hara").



Its name the "Ocean Shrine" is beautiful, too.



Strangely shaped rocks! "Mammoth Rock"

The historic landmark is bathed in light during a beautiful sunrise.



**5 Haru-no-Tsuji Ikikoku Park**  
Several Yayoi period (300 BCE – 250 CE) have been reconstructed on their original sites here, the ruins of an ancient kingdom.

### 6 Ryuda Shrine

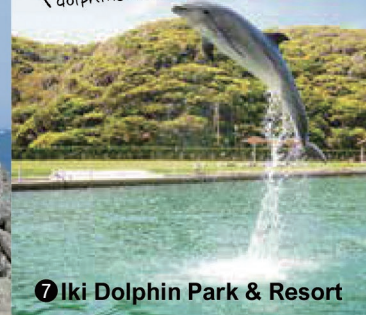
A scenic, oceanside shrine to the dragon god Ryuda.

The shrine also offers superb views of the ocean!



### 7 Iki Dolphin Park & Resort

Have a thrilling, up-close encounter with the adorable dolphins here.



### 8 Otoshima Beach

The white beach looks like a bridge leading to a small island. At this unusual place, waves come ashore from both sides.



Two waves create the sound of a unique Iki rhythm.

Early on summer mornings, you'll find the sun peeking out as it emerges from the horizon.



### 9 Oni-no-Ashiato (Devil's Footprint)

This enormous whole is said to have been left when a giant demon stepped on Iki Island. You can find the other footprint on Tatsunoshima.



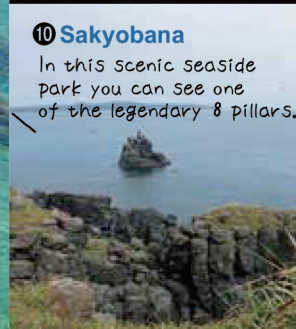

### 11 Takenotsuji Observation Platform

Enjoy panoramic island views from the island's highest peak.



### Tatsunoshima Island Cruise and Ferry

Tatsunoshima is an uninhabited island 10 minutes north of Iki. During the summer, you can enjoy the beautiful, secluded beach here. A short 40-minute sightseeing cruise will take you around the island so you can view the island's stunning cliffs and rock formations up-close. (Regular service from April 1 to November 30)



### Iki Dolphin Park & Resort

Here you can encounter the Park's dolphins up close! There are plenty of other activities where you can enjoy the island's natural scenery, such as day-camping, barbecuing, and paddle boarding (SUP).



### Fishing Excursion

Enjoy a guided fishing excursion on a chartered boat! Your captain will explain everything and ensure everyone has a good time, regardless of age or experience level.



### 12 Twins Beach

Shiotaru Beach and Komizuhama Beach are two small, secluded beaches connected by a walking path. Together they are called Twins Beach.

Enjoy a barbecue, too!



### 13 Kuyoshihama Beach

This beautiful white beach is one of the island's best kept secrets. In the winter surfing and birdwatching are popular activities here.



### 15 Ohama Beach

A popular destination for local families, this beach is distinguished by its shallow waters. The appearance of the beach changes significantly depending on whether it's high or low tide. Relax and enjoy the slow passage of time as you listen to the sound of the waves.

Despite its small size, Iki Island is full of beaches! The island's natural white sand is a rarity in Japan, and the ocean water's exceptional clarity will make you want to run into the surf. Whether you're young or old (or just young at heart), why not experience this island paradise.

### 14 Tsutsukihama Beach

This beach is about 600 meters long! Its natural white sand creates one of the most beautiful shorelines in Iki. The exceptionally clear, emerald-green ocean stretches out before you.

### 16 Nishikihama Beach

Encounter adorable-looking fish at this beach, which has exceptionally clear water. Of all Iki's beaches, Nishikihama Beach is a Mecca for marine sports like diving.

### 17 Tatsunoshima Beach

A secluded beach on an uninhabited island 10 minutes north of Iki. Take in the sparkling, emerald-green water, sheer cliffs, and strangely shaped rock formations.

Water-sledding, jet-skiing, snorkeling and many more, you can enjoy a variety of marine sports during the summer on Iki's beaches.



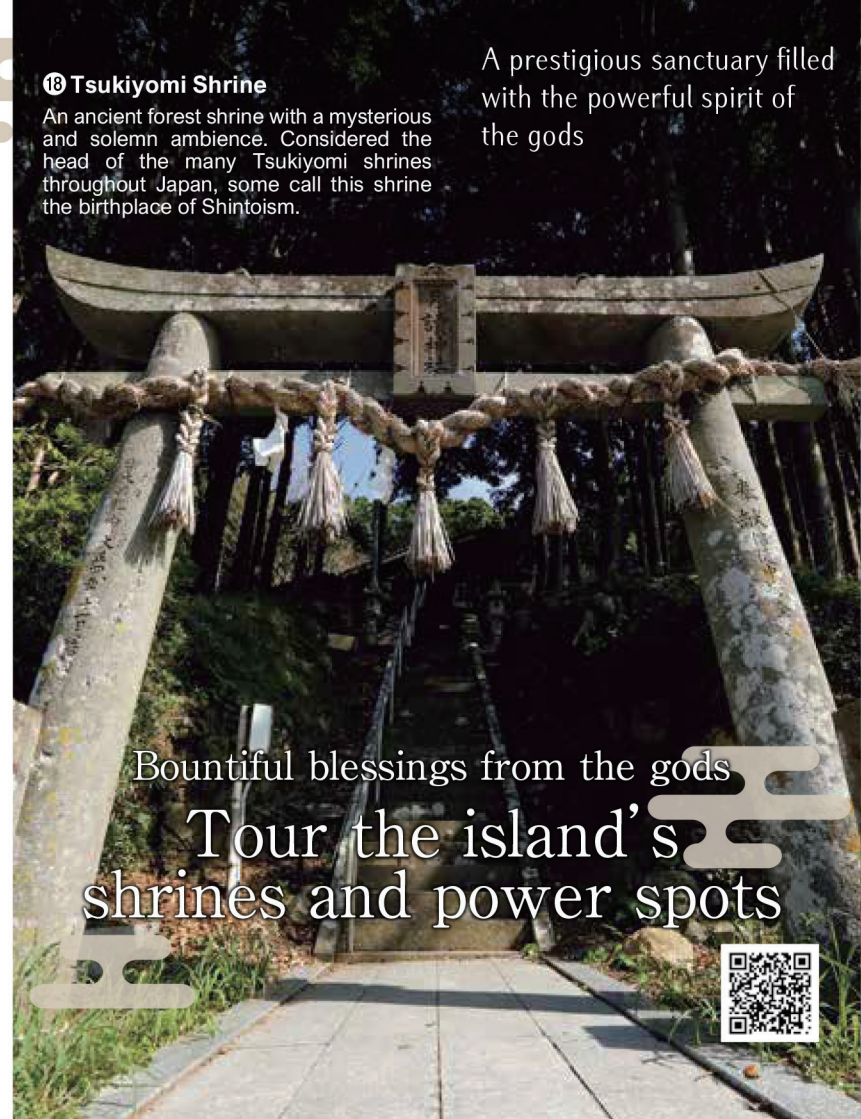
### Campsites

## Visit an island inhabited by the gods.

Some can be found near the ocean; others deep in the mountains. Iki island is home to over 1,000 shrines dotted around the island. The unusual “density” of gods and Iki’s appearance in the *Kojiki*, a historic chronicle of Japanese myth (712 CE) have led Iki to be called “the island of the gods”. It is said in the *Kojiki* that Iki was the 5<sup>th</sup> Japanese island to be created, born from the gods Izanagi and Izanami. The island itself is a deity called Amenohitotsubashira, and served as a bridge that connected the earth and the heavens.



### 18 Tsukiyomi Shrine

An ancient forest shrine with a mysterious and solemn ambience. Considered the head of the many Tsukiyomi shrines throughout Japan, some call this shrine the birthplace of Shintoism.

A prestigious sanctuary filled with the powerful spirit of the gods

### 19 Mendake Shrine

The sacred rock of this shrine exudes a mysterious energy that even deflects the needle of a compass. It is said that if you visit this shrine along with Ondake shrine, you'll be blessed with a good romantic match.

### 20 Kojima Shrine

The entire island this shrine is located on is considered sacred. A mystical power spot, a sand bridge to this mysterious shrine is revealed only during the low tide.

### 21 Hakusa Hachiman Shrine

One of Iki's seven most prominent shrines. You can find the motif of doves, considered messengers of the shrine, throughout. The panel paintings of the shrine's hall date back to the Meiji period!

## Small Shrine of Iki

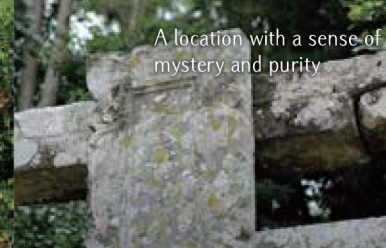
*Hokora* are a type of miniature Shinto shrine typically dedicated to minor Shinto gods. These small shrines are scattered all around Iki from deep in the forests, to next to harbors or within towns. Carefully preserved over the years, they represent the islanders desire to coexist with the gods as they go about their daily lives.



It's the most respected and highest-ranking shrine on the island.

### 24 Amanotanagao Shrine

Once one of the most venerated shrines on Iki, today the shrine is simple at first glance, but you can still feel vestiges of past splendor.

### 26 Amanotanagahime Shrine

A hidden powerspot near Amanotanagao Shrine. Five goddesses were once enshrined here before they were relocated to Amanotanagao Shrine. Today only the torii gate remains.



Over 300 stone monkey statues adorn the shrine

### 28 Ondake Shrine

The entire mountain where the shrine is located was considered sacred and access was restricted for ordinary people until the Meiji period. Enjoy a beautiful view and peaceful atmosphere at this mountain top shrine.

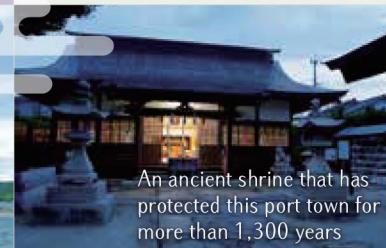
## Goshuin Stamp books

*Goshuin* are calligraphy seals that record shrine visits and represent a connection with that shrine's god. Stamp books, which also includes a mini-guidebook, are available for purchase, so you can collect *goshuin* as you explore the island. You can make reservations in advance to ensure a priest will be available at each shrine that offer *goshuin*.

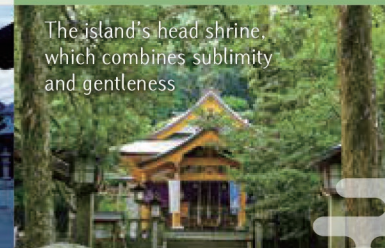

### 22 Shomogu Shrine

This Shrine has been watching over the historic port town of Katsumoto for over 1,000 years. One of the oldest shrines on the island, there are many artifacts to appreciate here.

### 25 Sumiyoshi Shrine

The head of all the Shrines of Iki, this is the most grand shrine on the island. Every December, *Daidai Kagura*, traditional Shinto music and dance is performed here by the priests of Iki Island.

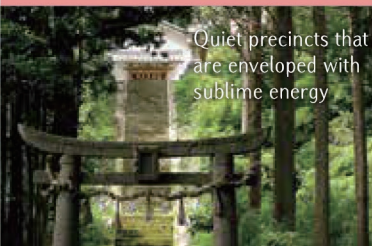
### 27 Sai Shrine

One of the most impactful shrines notable for its object of worship, a large carved wooden phallus. Worshipers here pray for marriage and to be blessed with children.

## Ikikagura

A style of sacred music and dance performed exclusively by the priests of Iki. This tradition has been passed down orally for over 700 years and consists of 35 pieces ranging in style from graceful to acrobatic. Variations of *kagura* are performed daily throughout the fall and winter, but the most somber variant, *Daidai Kagura* (Grand *Kagura*), is only performed twice a year (and lasts seven to eight hours.)

### 23 Kumano Shrine

Considered to be one with the Kii Kumano Shrine. As you approach the shrine experience an ambience that's reminiscent of the Kumano Kodo Road.

### 29 Ryuda Shrine

A small shrine to a dragon god by the ocean. The rocks along the cape where the shrine is located are said to resemble a dragons scales.

## Iki Tsushima and Goto as Border Islands Bridges between people since ancient times

Long ago, important cultural influences such as new technologies, knowledge, and foods, came by sea. The islands of Nagasaki Prefecture formed a sea route linking Japan with the Asian continent, and served as important centers of exchange. Among those islands, Iki comprised the frontline. During the Yayoi period, oceangoing trade brought extreme prosperity to Ikikoku, but at the same time, defenders were stationed here on the frontlines of the nation's defense.



### 30 Uchime Bay

Ancient trade ships anchored in this bay as they travelled from the Asian continent to Haru-no-Tsuji, the royal capital of Ikikoku.

### 32 Karakami Ruins

This moated settlement dates to the Yayoi period. The ruins of the oldest furnace in Japan to have been used in iron production were unearthed here.

### 33 Katsumoto Castle Ruins

(National Historic Landmark)  
This castle was built by Toyotomi Hideyoshi in just four months during the Imjin War. Its beautiful, robust stone walls remain a remarkable sight.

### 34 Namaike Castle Ruins

At the former location of this mid-16<sup>th</sup> century mountain castle, the impressive 5 meter deep dry moat remains.

### 35 Takenotsuji

The island's highest peak at 212.8 meters, this mountain, which hosted a beacon tower and lookout station, was strategically important in Japan's defense.

### 31 Haru-no-Tsuji Ruins

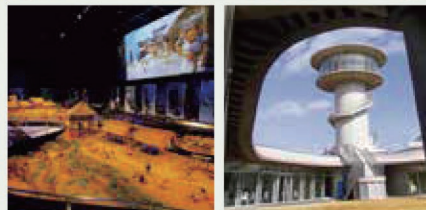
(National Special Historic Site)

This settlement was once the capital city of Ikikoku during the Yayoi period (300 BCE – 250 CE). A pioneering international city that prospered through oceangoing trade, more than 100,000 artifacts from this once prosperous city have been excavated here and 1,670 have been designated Important Cultural Properties. See several of these artifacts, including a stone sculpture of a face believed to be used in religious ceremonies, on display at the nearby Ikikoku Museum.

### 36 Iki City Ikikoku Museum

Nagasaki Prefectural Archaeological Center

This museum features exhibits of about 2,000 precious artifacts excavated from the ruins and kofun burial mounds that dot the island. Highlights of the museum include a short film showing what life was like in the Yayoi period, and a large diorama with 165 figures recreating scenes from Ikikoku. In the observation room, enjoy panoramic views of the Haru-no-Tsuji Ruins.

It was here that Mongol troops landed during the Battle of Bunei.

## 750 years since the invasion of Iki Mongol Invasions

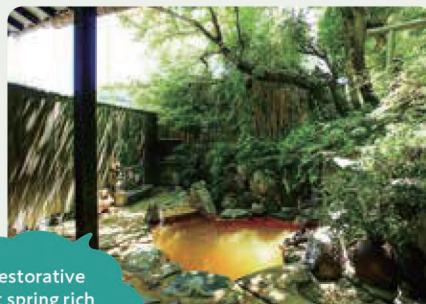
In this historic struggle, the Mongol Empire along with the Kingdom of Goryeo, attacked Tsushima and then Iki in an attempt to invade Japan. Iki island was invaded twice, once in 1274, known as the Battle of Bunei, and again in 1281, known as the Battle of Koan. During the Battle of Koan, Shoni Suketoki, the acting military governor of Iki at the time put up a desperate fight, but he and his forces were wiped out as they defended Iki Island.

Yunomoto Onsen

This quaint hot spring village is located in the northwestern part of the island. Its waters are also known as the "Blessed Child Spring" because it is said that it was here the Empress Jingu gave her son, the Emperor Ojin, his first bath about 1,700 years ago. The springs are notable for their cloudy, reddish-brown water due their high iron and salt content. The water has excellent heat and moisture retention properties and it's said that you'll feel warm for hours after bathing.

Ams Melons

This fruit is known for its juicy sweetness and melt-in-your-mouth consistency. Melons are carefully monitored to ensure high sugar concentration.

Gourmet Island Cuisine

Enjoy delicious cuisine from Iki, the gourmet Island. Try the many local specialties such as Iki squid and yellowtail known for their firm texture, sea urchin roe famous for their sweet taste and a smooth texture that seems to melt on your tongue, and rare, premium Iki-gyu...



Iki Squid Ikitsurugi

Known for its thick meat and a rich, sweet flavor. To be considered Ikitsurugi, a premium brand of high quality squid, the product must be more than 35 centimeters in length.

Abalone

These shellfish are hand-harvested by the island's traditional divers. Known for its plump meat and chewy texture, enjoying fresh abalone is one of the island's unique pleasures.

May through August



Iki Fugu

Producers blend Iki's refined, mineral-rich groundwater with saltwater pumped from deep underneath the ocean floor to create an optimized, low-salinity environment for raising tiger pufferfish.

Craft beer

The concept was to create a beer that would pair well with fish. It's brewed using the same white rice malt that is used to distill Iki shochu liquor.

Asparagus

This vegetable, which is produced by Eco Farmer-certified growers, is popular for its juicy sweetness.

February through October

Iki-gyu

Only 900 of this premium wagyu beef brand are raised each year. Because they are raised in mineral-rich pastures by the ocean, their meat is known for a soft texture with excellent fat marbling. Enjoying Iki-gyu as a steak or traditional Japanese yakiniku barbecue to let the flavor of the meat shine is very popular, but also make sure to try an Iki-gyu hamburger!

Iki Tofu

Each square of this tofu weighs about 1 kilogram. Traditional production techniques ensure the product delivers a simple taste that's nonetheless rich in soybean flavor.

Yellowtail

Typically caught one at a time by pole and line rather than by net, local fishermen take great pride in this superior product. Winter is the best time to enjoy this fish as the high fat content results in succulent slices of sashimi with a rich flavor.

Sea urchin-topped rice

Large in size and sweet in flavor, Iki's sea urchin roe is popular for its melt-in-your-mouth consistency. Enjoyed many ways including raw or as unimeshi, sea urchin steamed with rice, sea urchin roe is a delicacy you won't want to miss.

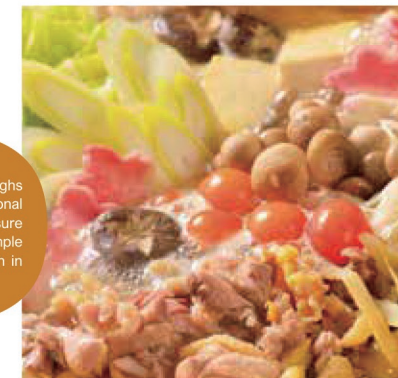

Iki Shochu Liquor

Iki is known as the birthplace of barley shochu. After mixing barley and malted rice in a 2:1 ratio, distillers age the liquor in barrels or tanks to give it a mellow flavor.
